CANTON — President, Judy Sourbeer announced at the Canton School Board meeting, held on Thursday, Jan. 11, that she received a letter of resignation, effective January 1, 2024, from Board Member, J. Scott

Member May was not present at the meeting, but he was in Region 2, with seven and one-half years of service on the board.
