Canton Elementary Wins First Place at Battle of the Books

Towanda Area Junior/Senior High School hosted the 2024 Interscholastic Reading Competition on Saturday, April 6, 2024. Twenty teams from area schools took part in the rigorous tournament, striving to prove themselves champions in their ability to read and remember information and facts from the forty books they had read in the preceding three months. Although there are three levels of competition, this year Canton only had a team at the elementary level.

The contest consists of four rounds of play: three speed rounds followed by a championship round. The speed rounds comprise forty questions, twenty asked alternately of the two teams. After the three speed rounds are played, teams are matched against closely scoring competitors for the championship round. During this round of play, each team is again asked twenty but if an incorrect response is given, the opponent has the opportunity to come up with the correct answer, thereby stealing the point. It is therefore possible to earn more than twenty points in

this round. In the first speed round, Canton's B.o.B. Squad played the Book Worms from St. John Neuman. Captained by Clara Mayek, Canton earned sixteen points over the eleven points earned by the Book Worms. Abigail Coxhead was captain for speed round two, in which the B.o.B. Squad battled East Lycoming's team King BoB. Canton again won the round, scoring eighteen points over King BoB's thirteen points. In round three, Gracie

The Rise of the Readers is a new team, and this was their first year of competition, so all the players were new to the experience. Their team was captained by Maci Wells, daughter of Mr. Mike Wells, principal of Canton Elementary School, who must have had ambivalent feelings about which team he should be rooting

on to victory! When team pairs for the final round were announced, Canton was pitted against the Book Shredders of Southern Tioga. Playing on that team was J.J. DeLozier, son of Mr. Jason DeLozier, Canton Elementary School's reading specialist, who, like Mr. Wells, had strong ties to both teams in the Going the round, the Book Shredders had fortytwo points, while the B.o.B. Squad had forty-six points, so this was a close match. Elleyahnna VanNoy captained for Canton. This proved to be an intense round. The first thirteen questions were all answered correctly, but then Canton gave an incorrect response to question fourteen, and Southern Tioga stole the point. Two correct answers followed, but the Book Shredders missed question seventeen and the B.o.B. Squad stole the point. When the halfway scores for the round were announced, the two teams were tied with ten points each. The room was full of tension as the play re-

When the final scores were announced, it was a tie, nineteen to nineteen! The Canton team knew they were ahead of the Book Shredders, but no one in the room had any idea of the scores earned by the other nine teams playing at the elementary level.

> All players, coaches, and spectators proceeded to the auditorium for the awards ceremony. The announcer complimented all the teams for their hard work in reading forty books, reminded everyone that the day was a celebration of reading and readers, and told the students that they were all winners because readers become leaders. He then announced the three top teams at each level and presented the winning teams with trophies and ribbons. At the elementary level, the B.o.B. Squad from Canton took first place, the Book Shredders from Southern Tioga took second place, and the Book Warriors from Northern Tioga took third place. At the middle school/junior high level, first place went to the Black Knight Bibliophiles of Towanda, second place to Peanut's Page Turners of Wyalusing, and third place to the Rebellious Readers of Tunkhannock. The First place high school trophy went to the Page Turners from Muncy, second place to the Readaholic Buzzards from Towanda, and third place to the Procrastinators from Sullivan County.
